Formal Call for Papers

Common Europe Conference 2004, will be the largest iSeries event to be held this side of the Atlantic next year. This event will be staged at the Cardiff International Arena over the period June 19th – 22nd 2004. Common UK is proud to have been chosen as host of this event, and is now inviting submissions for presentations to be included in the programme.

All sessions submitted will be reviewed for inclusion in the agenda and should be based upon the following criteria:

- 50 minute duration
- educational/information based session - not a marketing/sales session or a product pitch.
- iSeries, e-business or LINUX related
- sessions on iSeries programming and operations basics, Security, Domino, LPAR, WebSphere and Web-Enablement are particularly welcome, as these will be the main themes of the event

The complete programme for Common Europe Conference 2004 will consist of four technical, education and information streams, two streams of hands-on lab education sessions and certification and application solutions streams. There will be a strong representation of speakers from IBM Rochester and Toronto. The event will host the annual European IBM International Technical Support Organization (ITSO) Technical Forum, bringing IBM Red Book writers to the UK, and will also see iSeries News technical writers coming from the UK and from the US.

If you are involved in iSeries in Europe or the UK, you should be in Cardiff in June, and be part of this programme.
